Beginning in 1952, Wethersfield (CT) Country Club became the home of a PGA event, the Insurance City Open. Kids flocked to the club to caddy and, if they were good enough, would caddy for the PGA tour players who played in the event. There were no professional caddies as there are now. Instead, every golf professional--be it Palmer or Nicklaus or Player or Trevino-- had a different kid on his bag each week as he worked his way around the country, trying to make a buck. My friends and I were those kids and this is our story. The author of *Blood Orchid* and *Blue Desert* presents a biography on his friend, the writer and environmentalist, Edward Abbey. A passionate advocate for preserving wilderness and fighting the bureaucratic and business forces that would destroy it, Edward Abbey (1927–1989) wrote fierce, polemical books such as *Desert Solitaire* and *The Monkey Wrench Gang* that continue to inspire environmental activists. In this eloquent memoir, his friend and fellow desert rat Charles Bowden reflects on Abbey the man and the writer, offering up thought-provoking, contrarian views of the writing life, literary reputations, and the perverse need of critics to sum up "what he really meant and whether any of it was truly up to snuff." *The Red Caddy* is the first literary biography of Abbey in a generation. Refusing to turn him into a desert guru, Bowden instead recalls the wild man in a red Cadillac convertible for whom liberty was life. He describes how *Desert Solitaire*

paradoxically “launched thousands of maniacs into the empty ground” that Abbey wanted to protect, while sealing his literary reputation and overshadowing the novels that Abbey considered his best books. The format of eighteen holes (chapters) par 72 begins with a brief story on the game of golf, half a page or less, followed by an illustration of this concept in the actual Game of Life, finishing with a “Holing Out” conclusion. Some chapters are longer (par 5s), while others are shorter (par 3s), providing a unique approach. The principles outlined in the book would equally apply to individuals or organisations, large or small. For anyone planning a dream golfing vacation

In addition to its practical travel tips, this book offers insightful essays -- including several by leading figures in Irish golf -- that explain the history and particular character of golfing in Ireland. Vacation planners will especially love the book's extensive, geographically balanced coverage of individual golf courses, presented by way of two whimsically named lists. The *Trolleys List* contains thorough summaries of 153 courses, including small maps and directions for getting there, scorecard data, descriptions of each course's layout and club facilities, and recommendations on local restaurants and hotels. The *Squibs List* offers basic information -- addresses, phone numbers, brief descriptions -- about 138 additional golf courses. With *Trolleys and Squibs*, you can plan a detailed itinerary and make your reservations, even before landing on Irish shores (though armchair travelers as well will gain immense enjoyment from the colorful portraits of the courses and countryside). It has been many years since the last book on golfing in Kenya was written. Comprehensive in its coverage, this guide covers all aspects of golfing in Kenya. It has been written with the visiting golfer in mind, but is nonetheless candid and includes much local humour and club lore. Cartoons, area and course maps and photographs in full colour, and descriptions of area side-trips and diversions are also included. Background information on the history of the sport, and planning a golfing safari are given. Five chapters cover the five sections of the country into which the golf courses have been grouped, each section giving an area map and club fact files, and an overview of play for the

course. The final part of the book gives information about getting about, accommodation, and other useful travel information. A gold mine of knowledge from Golf Tips magazine, conveniently sized to slip into a golf bag—or a Christmas stocking. With this guide, golfers will be able to find the advice they need, exactly when they need it. Smartly designed to fit into a golf-bag pocket and profusely illustrated with photos and drawings, The Pocket Caddy takes the best of several years' worth of instruction from Golf Tips magazine and distills it into nearly 80 bite-size nuggets of golfing gold. Inside, players eager to improve will find practice drills that address those sticky ongoing problems of technique, as well as on-course fixes that will get them back into the groove when things go awry. The practice suggestions include the Baseball and Whoosh drills to add power with the driver; the Split Hands to stop slices; and the Two Strings, which gets the putter on track. Those fixes run the gamut from strategic adjustments (how to keep the ball low when hitting into the wind) to specific advice on troublesome shots (when it's okay to putt out of a greenside trap). This is simply the ultimate guide to lasting improvement—on the tee, on the course, and on the scorecard.
